



# LPL Celebrates Thirty-Six Years

August 2nd, 2018 marks thirty-six years of childcare for Little Peoples Landing. We are so thankful for all of the families and employees who have been part of the LPL family over all of these years. We are appreciative to all of our families for letting us be a part of their children's lives and to all of our past and present employees for their dedication to the children in their care. A lot has changed over the course of thirty years, but our commitment to keeping kids safe, building an educational foundation and making it all fun has always been our number one goal!

## Fun facts about LPL:

- Family owned and operated from the start
- One 36 year employee
- Five 18-28 Year employees
- Five 13-17 Year employees
- Sixteen 5-10 Year employees
- Over 1000 children attending our 8 schools
- We have 53 families that have been with us 5-10 years and 3 families over ten years 3 parents attended LPL as children
- 4 staff members attended LPL as children
- LPL was the first center to offer infant care and was commended by the State of Colorado as a model for the care of infants
- We were the first childcare center to offer a Parent's Night Out service
- We are the only childcare center to offer a New Years Sleepover for kids so parents can enjoy a worry free New Years night

# Why we ...

## ....COMBINE CLASSROOMS

During early morning and late afternoon we move our children into groups to better utilize our staff. This "grouping" is an ongoing exercise and changes from hour to hour and day to day depending on when, and at what rate the children arrive and leave the school every day. In the morning children are "grouped" until we have enough children in a particular age group to warrant a teacher. Then they are moved into their regular classroom. They are only "grouped" at the end of



the day, when the number of children remaining in that particular age group no longer warrants a teacher.

## OFFER A HAIRCUT SERVICE

A fundamental concept of LPL is to serve the entire family, not just the children. To that end we have a number of programs designed to make our parent's life more "hassle free". One of our programs is children's haircuts. We have contracted with a local beautician to come into our schools once or twice a month to provide a haircut service to those parents who desire it for their children. We have a convenient form that we use which allows the parent the opportunity to describe in detail what kind of haircut he/she desires for their child. We realize some parents consider their child's haircut a family outing and others want to be there to personally direct the way their child's hair is cut. This service is intended to be for the parents who do not fit into these categories and would rather spend family time doing other things.



## CHECK IDENTIFICATION



In these uncertain times, with the innumerable custody variations imposed by the courts, releasing a child to a "parent" is not as straight forward as it used to be. Because we deal

with so many family situations and must remain neutral in all cases we must have a system that protects the child, the parents and LPL.

The person who signs our contract is the only person who may designate someone to pick up his/her child because that person is the only one we have a child-care contract with. Some of you have expressed irritation when you or someone you have designated is asked for identification because the employee releasing the child does not recognize you or the person you have designated. Our employees are given specific instructions that if they do not **positively** identify you they must ask you for identification. WHEN IN DOUBT THEY ASK FOR IDENTIFICATION! If they violate this rule they can lose their job. The definition of proper identification is: Picture ID and the individual reciting their code word/number.

One of the problems we have encountered is the parents not giving the person picking up their child their code number. Not having the proper code number on file causes confusion and embarrassment for the legitimate person picking up your child. We require the code number because we have experienced people using false identification when trying to pick up a child. Additionally, they need to enter their code word to enable them to enter the classroom area.

An area that causes confusion and irritation is when parents in a custody dispute want to pick up their child. Many times the **COURTS** will not allow one of the parents to pick up their child. We are bound by that court order and may not release the child. Because of incidents like the one just noted the fact that the child recognizes the parent does not automatically mean we will not check identification. If the parent who signed the contract with us removes anyone, including the spouse, from the pickup list we must abide by that fact. The courts require us to adhere to the requests of the person we have a contract with.

Remember if only one parent signed our contract the other parent must be listed on our authorization for pickup file before we can release the child to that par-




## Pitch a Tent

Get use out of your tent all summer long

This camping trip mainstay can serve a variety of purposes beyond providing shelter and sleeping quarters. Set one up in the backyard and you've got:

- a shady retreat for summer reading, listening to music, or journal writing
- a clubhouse for kids only (siblings, cousins, neighborhood friends)
- a changing room for sprinkler games and kiddie-pool days
- the perfect venue for an after-dinner shadow puppet show (The Little Book of Hand Shadows, published by Running Press, features more than two dozen creatures that are fun for kids to create)
- an insect-proof concert hall for listening to a symphony of crickets and peepers



### What you do:

Go into a dark room. Have your child hold his or her hand in front of a lamp or flashlight so it casts a shadow on the wall



## Shadow Puppets

What you will need: lamp or flashlight, blank wall or tent, and a dark room

### What you talk about:

Tell your child that shadows are made when something gets in the way of light and blocks the light out.

Have your child make another hand shadow. Tell him or her to move the light closer to the hand.

Then ask, "What happens to the shadow when the light is closer?" (*The shadow gets longer.*)

Next, have your child move the light farther from the hand.

Then ask, "What happens to the shadow when the light is farther?" (*The shadow gets shorter.*)

## 10. Raspberry S'mores

**S'Mores** are made with graham crackers, toasted marshmallows, fresh raspberries, chocolate hazelnut spread, and this beautifully simple raspberry sauce

### Ingredients for Raspberry Sauce

- 1 cup fresh raspberries
- 1 cup powdered sugar

### Instructions

1. In a small sauce pan, combine the raspberries and sugar over medium heat.
2. Smash the berries with a potato masher and mix until the sugar is dissolved.
3. Bring the mixture to a simmer and cook for 2 minutes.
4. Remove from heat and cool for 5 minutes before transferring to a jar. Seal with a lid and store in the refrigerator for up to one week.

- Why we should breathe properly.




## Weekly Theme: Back to School Focus

- Will I make new friends?




## Weekly Theme: Nursery Rhymes

- Nursery rhymes also teach children that language can be fun.




## Weekly Theme: Camping, Fishing, Wildlife




